Argumentative Project

Find another method to argue your case. Consider these "**Living CSETs**." Embedded within each project will be your **claim**, **set-up**, **evidence** and **tie-in**. At the end you may challenge the audience, pose a question, or use another appropriate conclusion technique.

Consider which format would be most appropriate for your topic. Decide which information to cull from your piece to create a condensed yet effective message. You may choose from the following formats:

- Poster To be introduced and displayed. Should be neat and colorful (deliberate choices should be made regarding images and color). May include a chart or graph.
- Podcast To be shared with class. Should be well-written and could include an interview (with an expert/authority on the topic). Approximately one minute in length. Listen to short podcasts on NPR to get an idea.
- Public Service Announcement (video) To be shared with class. Should be well-planned.
 Approximately one minute in length. Look up some PSAs to get an idea (The More You Know, for example.)
- Rap To be performed. Will only work for "lighter" topics. Approximately one minute in length.
- Song To be sung. Approximately one minute in length.
- Poem To be read to class. Consider rhyme scheme. Take the same precautions as with a rap. Approximately one minute in length.
- Short Story To be read to class. Should be well-written. Can be recorded like a podcast. Approximately one minute in length.
- Skit To be performed. Should be well-thought-out and well-rehearsed. Approximately one minute in length.
- Power point presentation to support short speech. To be presented. About one minute in length. Slides can include charts, graphs, etc.

Reminders:

- The project should include your **strongest evidence** and show **attention to detail**.
- o It's important your audience know that you take this topic seriously.
- Podcasts, PSAs, Power Points, and recorded short stories should be saved to a flash drive.
